This second Sunday of Advent, we focus on the theme of love; the love of God. As we prepare for the arrival of the Messiah, let us reflect on the amazing love of God. He lowered Himself to be one with us, He suffered an excruciating death for our salvation, and He continues to journey with us each day of our lives. Are there ways that you can show your love of others in these ways? To experience their suffering? To journey with them? To give them a sign of God's love for them?
